and well serviced with amenities for tourists, but you should plan ahead, especially when heading to remote regions or into harsh terrains, which might be unfamiliar to visitors.

RESEARCH

Get to know the regions, national parks and local conditions before you visit by conducting research online. Check **dbca.wa.gov.au** for alerts and contact the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions for up-to-date track conditions, water levels and fire danger. Go to **bom.gov.au** for current weather conditions. Local shire offices provide total fire ban information and latest road conditions. ABC Local Radio broadcasts regular alerts when areas are threatened by emergencies.

PLAN AHEAD

WA is much larger than most people realise, so it is important to know how far away your intended destinations are and how long it will take you to drive there. Tourism WA and RAC WA provide a range of road maps and suggested itineraries. Make sure you have packed gear suitable for your destination. Make checklists and follow them — what to pack, what to do when arriving at and departing from a caravan park or campsite, list of tools, spares, daily vehicle and caravan checks.

EQUIPMENT

Ensure your equipment is appropriate, in good condition and you know how to use it. Take essential supplies such as a first aid kit, torch, matches, extra fuel, food and water in case of unexpected delays. Travel light – it is kinder to your vehicle, reduces fuel consumption, minimises packing and unpacking, and simplifies your life.

MOBILE PHONE COVERAGE

There are many areas of WA in which your mobile phone won't work, and in remote areas passing cars can be few and far between. If you are travelling off-road, look at investing in a satellite phone and importantly let someone know where you are going before you head off.

NOTIFY PEOPLE YOU TRUST

Tell a trusted and responsible person where you are going, what you are doing, how often you will be in contact and when you expect to return.

DRINKING WATER

The availability of water in parts of WA, especially for drinking, cannot be guaranteed. Always carry enough for your own needs; don't expect to find water supplies in natural watercourses. Treat any available water to make it safe for consumption unless it is indicated that it is safe to drink. Carry and drink three to four litres of water per person per day.

SETTING UP CAMP

Use designated campgrounds/caravan parks and choose your site carefully – level ground, no sharp objects, no ant nests. Check the prevailing wind direction for placement of tents, stoves, awnings and other equipment. Overhanging branches can come crashing down on a hot or windy night – gum trees are the worst offenders – so be cautious in your choice of site. Never camp in 'dry' riverbeds or any other place where water could channel during rain. Be cautious in tidal flats, make sure your camp is above the high tide level and always stay croc-wise.

WEATHER AND SUN PROTECTION

Be prepared for unexpected changes in weather. Wild, wet winters, cyclones, freezing nights and scorching summer days are common in some parts of the state. WA's vast size means that the seasons can be very different across the state, from the tropical north to the Mediterranean south. Consider visiting during mild times of the year.

Many First Nations people follow their own calendars, such as the six Noongar seasons in WA's South West region, which can be a more accurate guide as to what to expect. Always wear a hat, long sleeves and SPF50+ sunscreen, even on overcast days, and make sure you stay hydrated at all times.

BUSHFIRES

Bushfires are extremely dangerous and common year-round in WA. They can start without warning and spread rapidly. If you see or smell signs of a fire act immediately to put your safety first. Don't wait and see, as the consequences can be catastrophic. In case of bushfire call 000, contact the local Parks and Wildlife office and listen for alerts on ABC Local Radio.

CYCLONES

Cyclone season officially runs from November to April, with the coastline north of Exmouth being most prone to experiencing the strong winds and heavy rain associated with a cyclone event. On average, about two cyclones cross the coast per year, one of which is severe. In the event of a cyclone warning check **dfes.wa.gov.au** and listen for alerts on ABC Local Radio.

WII DI IFF

While Australia is home to many dangerous animals, serious incidents are rare. The vast majority of animal encounters on land or in the water are safe if you treat animals with respect and avoid approaching or feeding any wildlife.

Snakes generally avoid human contact. Wearing boots and loose pants can protect areas most at risk of a bite. If you are bitten, immobilise the bite area to avoid the spread of venom and seek immediate medical assistance.

Tick and insect bites and stings are best avoided by wearing long, loose, light-coloured clothing and using insect repellents. Check for the presence of ticks on your skin, clothes and equipment during and after bush visits.

Jellyfish including the potentially lethal box jellyfish can be present in WA waters. The box jellyfish are most prevalent in tropical waters from November to April. If you do swim, snorkel or dive in high risk areas, wear a full-length stinger/wet suit and if you are stung, douse liberally with vinegar and seek urgent medical advice.

Sharks can be sighted along all of WA's beautiful beaches. Popular beaches are regularly patrolled and sometimes beaches are temporarily closed if a shark has been sighted or an incident has occurred. Swim at patrolled beaches and inside shark nets where possible.

Saltwater crocodiles live in a variety of habitats in the far north (Kimberley region), including coastal waters near beaches and offshore islands. Crocs are common and deadly so heed all risk warning signs. If you are unsure contact the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions office.

TRAVEL TO ABORIGINAL COMMUNITIES

When visiting remote and regional areas, please be aware that you may need to apply for a permit to travel through Aboriginal reserves, and/or pay for access to certain native title determination areas. Check with the community before leaving and heed the current advice before you travel at your nearest visitor centre or at wa.gov.au.



Make sure you are prepared for the local conditions before you depart. Where possible travel on gazetted roads and stay in designated campgrounds/caravan parks. Use your own water supplies when possible; try not to deplete water supplies in remote areas. Never bathe with soap, shampoo hair or wash clothes or dishes in rivers, lakes or the ocean and use biodegradable soap, dishwashing liquid and shampoo.

Take all rubbish with you when you leave and if your caravan or motorhome has an on-board toilet, only empty it at designated dump points installed in caravan parks and some townsites. Never empty a chemical toilet in the bush or in a biodegradable toilet such as those available in some national parks.

Don't take souvenirs such as wildflowers, coral, shells, rocks or fossils and leave property, gates and equipment as you found them.

Always check with **dfes.wa.gov.au** before lighting a campfire to ensure the area you are travelling in does not have a fire ban in place. Build campfires in a small enclosed space and use fire pits or previous campfire sites. Keep fires small; build them away from trees and dry bush and extinguish them with water at night. Only use wood provided or collect dead wood without damaging undergrowth or live bush.

Don't approach, touch or feed wild birds or animals. They can be unpredictable and may inflict injuries. Human germs and food may make them sick. Respect WA's unique environment and keep it pristine for future generations to enjoy.

THE LEAVE NO TRACE PRINCIPLES

- 1 Plan ahead and prepare.
- 2 Travel and camp on firm ground.
- 3 Dispose of waste correctly.
- 4 Leave what you find.
- 5 Minimise the impact of campfire (when permitted).
- 6 Respect wildlife.
- 7 Be considerate of hosts and other visitors.

Safe Driving in WA

ROAD CONDITIONS

Always check road conditions before departure as rain can make some tracks and roads impassable. Not all country roads are sealed; they can be gravel, dirt and sand surfaces. Vehicles on these roads create dust clouds making visibility poor. Keep your distance from the car in front and be prepared for dust and stones from cars travelling in the opposite direction. Do not brake suddenly on gravel roads, as you are likely to skid and lose control – slow down and take care on unsealed roads. Many sealed roads also have gravel edges – drivers can easily lose control of their vehicle if they veer into them at high speed.

HAZARDS

Watch for animals such as kangaroos, cattle and large birds that often settle on the road. Animals are more active around dusk and dawn and are often confused by the sound of a vehicle. If a large animal suddenly appears on the road in front of you, brake firmly and sound your horn. Do not try to swerve around them as you are likely to lose control or roll over. Avoid driving at night when possible.

TOWING

When towing a caravan, trailer or boat, know the legal load limit for your vehicle and make sure your load is well-secured. If your car and caravan is more than 7.5 metres long, you must keep at least 200 metres behind any similar car/caravan or long vehicle on all roads outside built-up areas, unless you are overtaking. The legal speed limit outside built-up areas for a vehicle towing a trailer or caravan, unless otherwise signposted, is 100 kilometres per hour.

ROAD SAFETY TIPS

- O To drive in WA you must hold a current driver's licence from your state, territory or country and carry it with you always.
- Always make sure your vehicle and caravan are in top mechanical condition before you set off on your adventure.
- Use a current road map. Do not rely on mobile devices.
- O Be sure to carry plenty of extra food, fuel, water and vehicle spares, especially when on remote tracks. If your vehicle breaks down or cannot be driven, always stay with it. It is much easier to spot a vehicle during an aerial search.
- O Take extra care around road trains. Be patient, maintain a safe distance and only overtake if you are sure it is safe.
- O Do not drive tired. Take rest stops every couple of hours and swap drivers regularly.
- O Concentrate on what you are doing and minimise distractions.
- O Drive with extra care while towing, especially when braking, cornering, overtaking and parking. Be aware that it is much heavier and may be wider than a normal vehicle.
- Overtake with caution, especially passing large vehicles.
- O Drive at a consistent speed within the speed limits.

Safety Checklist

- Research your destination and make sure you have packed the right gear.
- Make sure you have up-to-date maps and plan your route.
- Notify someone of your destination and when you intend to return.
- O Check the weather. If it is going to be cold or windy, for example, you will need to take extra gear.
- Check all your equipment tent, accessories, gas stove, gas bottle, mantles, lights, inflatable mattresses, stretchers, water supplies, fire extinguisher, fridge, shower – the lot.
- Have your vehicle and caravan serviced.
- Ensure you have plenty of drinking water.
- Pack hats, sunscreen and long sleeved clothing to protect you from the sun, even while driving.
- Make sure you and your vehicle are prepared for the road conditions you will be travelling on.
- O Ensure you follow the safe driving tips provided on the left.
- Consider taking a four-wheel drive training course if you will be travelling off the bitumen, going to remote areas or doing any sand driving.
- If you are going sand driving, learn how to do it properly and take a compressor and shovel. You may also want to take a snatch strap and know how to use it safely and correctly.
- Never try to recover a bogged vehicle by attaching a snatch strap to the bumper, tow ball or manufacturer-supplied 'tie downs'. For safe snatch strap recovery, have rated recovery points fitted on the chassis by a professional.
- Ensure you have a GPS, maps and appropriate communications equipment (mobile phone, satellite phone, UHF radio, etc).
- O Consider the availability of power and plan accordingly.
- Book your site ahead of time if possible to avoid disappointment.
- O Carry a toolkit and know how to use it.
- Take a first aid course and carry a first aid kit.
- Ensure you have a first aid app on your phone before you leave.





Quarantine WA operates border checkpoints as a first line of defence against incursions of unwanted pests, weeds and diseases, which could arrive on freight, cargo and other items brought in from interstate.

Place any item that may pose a biosecurity risk in a quarantine bin or hand them to a guarantine inspector. Under biosecurity legislation, private travellers must declare all organisms and potential carriers immediately on arrival at a checkpoint. Road checkpoints at Kununurra (Victoria Highway – WA/NT border) and Eucla (Eyre Highway - WA/SA border) operate 24 hours a day throughout the year.

Western Australia has strict quarantine measures in place to keep the state free from common pests, weeds and diseases that are present elsewhere.


HERE ARE JUST SOME PRESCRIBED POTENTIAL CARRIERS THAT QUARANTINE WA REQUIRES TO BE DECLARED:

- O Bees, honey and other hive products
- O Animal feed of plant origin other than processed or manufactured feed for dogs, cats and fish
- Plants and/or plant products, including flowers, cuttings, bulbs, fruit and vegetables (excludes canned or cooked plant products)
- Seeds
- O Soil
- Absorbent pet litter derived from plant material
- O Plant growing and landscaping materials such as potting mix, wood chips and mulch
- Any container used for, or in connection with, agricultural products
- Non-potable water

There are no major entry restrictions for cats and dogs. Owners are, however, required to brush the animal(s) to remove any seeds in their fur prior to arrival. There are restrictions for birds, reptiles, fish and frogs, and permits or licences may be required for some of these. For more information please visit agric.wa.gov.au

The Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions has plenty of information to help you enjoy your experience and stay safe when you visit national parks and other conservation areas.

- · Use Explore Parks WA (exploreparks.dbca.wa.gov.au) to find the best places for you to go. Search by the activities you like or where dogs are permitted.
- Use Park Stay WA (parkstay.dbca.wa.gov.au) to book ahead where possible and to check campground conditions. Check to see if you will be able to light a fire and use the campsite availability guide if you plan to camp at busy times.
- Find out what fees you may need to pay. Buy an annual park pass online to make it easier to enter. To book your campsite, try and book online otherwise take the correct change with you when you need to pay with cash onsite.



are unique to WA, appear as if from nowhere in a spectacular showcase of the region's incredible biodiversity.

Landscapes from coast to forest and city to outback burst into colour during the six-month flowering season, which begins on the vast outback plains of the Pilbara, Goldfields and Coral Coast in July. By September the spectacle moves south to Perth's botanical gardens, nature reserves and national parks, with the season ending in October and November throughout the forests and coastal heaths of the South West.

There are scenic drives, tours and walking trails specifically designed to take advantage of the stunning displays across much of WA. The options to see WA's remarkable wildflowers are endless - and with such long seasons. there's always a good time to see nature at its finest.

Remember to take nothing but photos – picking wildflowers is illegal and can attract a \$2000 fine. Respect private property and don't trespass. Protect crops and prevent the spread of disease by staying out of canola fields.



AUSTRALIA'S NORTH WEST



Only half an hour from the Northern Territory border in the north-east of WA, the town of **Kununurra** / **Goonoonoorrang** is an ideal spot from which to launch your adventure in the breathtaking Kimberley. It is worth taking time to explore this picturesque town, set on the banks of Lake Kununurra and the mighty Ord River. It is well equipped to stock up on supplies and is home to Aboriginal art galleries, pink diamond boutiques and outback cafés. Enjoy spectacular views of town by joining the locals taking in the sunset from **Kelly's Knob Lookout**.

Just a five-minute drive from the centre of town is the area's 'best-kept secret', the 350-million-year-old sandstone ranges in **Mirima National Park (Hidden Valley)**. Watch the colours change as the sun dances across the range, truly a photographer's dream.


Nearby **Lake Argyle** is an opportunity to explore the wildlife-rich waters of the biggest man-made lake in the southern hemisphere. Cruise the expansive waters, fish for barramundi or see over 240 local species of birds – almost one third of Australia's known species.

Book a river cruise along the **Ord River**, or take on the majestic landscape under your own steam with a kayak tour, which can be booked from Kununurra.

To the south is the World Heritage-listed **Purnululu National Park**, home to the stunning sandstone domes known as the **Bungle Bungle Range**. Enjoy a number of hikes through the range, including the spectacular amphitheatre of red rock that is **Cathedral Gorge**.

Explore the unique features of the Bungle Bungles from the air on a scenic flight from Kununurra or between May and September you can add a few days on to your itinerary and camp at one of the two sites within the park. Drive the four-wheel drive track into the park and experience the spectacle up close on a guided walking tour.






There are 33 exceptionally beautiful waterways that traverse the Kimberley, and are also some of the last remaining truly natural ecosystems in Australia.

Take a short detour off the Gibb River Road to explore the sandstone ranges, waterfalls and broad tidal flats of the spectacular El Questro Wilderness Park.

Book a tour or go on a self-guided hike to discover ragged cliff faces and palm-fringed waterholes before cooling off with a dip in the iconic **Emma Gorge** or ease sore hiking legs into the thermal waters of Zebedee Springs.

Learn more about the local Aboriginal people and purchase authentic arts and crafts by visiting an Aboriginal art gallery such as Warlayirti Artists Aboriginal Corporation or Warmun Art Centre. Many Aboriginal experiences are available throughout the region and you can experience the power of a traditional Corroboree by the Miriwoong Gajerrong people at the Waringarri Corroboree Under the Stars (which is part of the Ord Valley Muster). You can also see the region through the eyes of one of the world's oldest surviving cultures with a local guide by **Camping** with Custodians.

The northern-most township in Western Australia, Wyndham, is a small historical port settlement with the character and spirit of a true outback town. The nearby Five Rivers Lookout offers one of the most dramatic views anywhere along the Australian coast.





- Stop in for morning tea and enjoy the famous scones at Ellenbrae Station.
- Explore the rainforests and open woodlands surrounding **Drysdale River Station.**
- Take a detour along the Kalumburu Road to explore the spectacular Mitchell Plateau and Mitchell Falls.
- Explore the tranquil pools of the Lower Manning Gorge via the **Mount Barnett Roadhouse**, and see the stunning waterfall and Yallamia Pool at Upper Manning Gorge.
- ☐ Watch waterfalls cascade 100 metres down perfect u-shaped cliffs at the iconic Bell Gorge.
- Meet the locals from the Iminitii Campground Art Centre at the foot of the spectacular Wunaamin Miliwundi Ranges.
- Hike through the **Windjana Gorge National Park** and marvel at formations made up of an ancient reef system formed around 350 milllion years ago.
- Pack your swimmers for an incredible walk, wade and swim through Tunnel Creek (Dimalurru National Park).
- Spend some time exploring gorges tucked away on the stations along the Gibb River Road.



Visit the iconic **Mitchell Plateau** where the famous four-tiered **Mitchell Falls** tumble from one pool to the next. The falls can only be reached by foot or by air, making it one of the most remote and inaccessible places in Australia.

At the end of the Gibb River Road are the boab tree lined streets of **Derby**. Situated on the tidal mud flats of King Sound, it is a great base from which to explore the **Buccaneer Archipelago**. Take a short flight or cruise to explore the islands and their beaches, lush rainforests, fringing mangroves and turquoise waters. The **Horizontal Falls** – where huge tidal movements force masses of seawater through a narrow gap in the high cliff walls – are a must-see.

Alternatively you can take the sealed **Great Northern Highway** from Kununurra to Derby, which leads you through the outback towns of **Halls Creek** and **Fitzroy Crossing**. Marking the northern end of the

famous Canning Stock Route, Halls Creek is worth a stop before you further explore **Purnululu National Park** or venture out to **Wolfe Creek Crater**, the second largest meteorite crater on Earth.

Between Halls Creek and Fitzroy Crossing are the spectacular **Mimbi Caves**, where you can stop off for a cool dip in one of the freshwater pools before you explore the spectacular karst cliffs and learn more about the Aboriginal culture and history from a local guide. To visit you must self-drive and book a cultural cave discovery with the Gooniyandi people. The Mimbi Caves campsite has 15 sites, hot showers and barbeque facilities. It is the perfect spot to watch the sunset over the nearby ranges.

Fitzroy Crossing is a great base to explore WA's oldest cave system at **Tunnel Creek National Park** and the freshwater pools carved into the **Windjana Gorge National Park** by the Lennard River.

Get an insight into thousands of years of Aboriginal history and culture with hundreds of archaeological sites showcasing rock engravings across the Burrup Peninsula. The peninsula is home to the largest concentration of petroglyphs, which to the untrained eye may seem like faded images on rock faces, but with expert guidance from local tour providers, reveal almost 50,000 years of recorded evolution.

Hearson's Cove is a small sandy beach with steep rugged hills where you can walk for hundreds of metres on the exposed tidal flats and, if you are lucky, spot turtles in the coral cay.

The Dampier Archipelago's string of 42 pristine islands are a glimpse into an untamed wilderness that is home to sponge gardens, more than 650 species of fish, turtles, dugongs, whales and dolphins.

Two hours south from Karratha is the lush desert oasis of **Millstream Chichester National Park**, with tranquil chocolate-brown gorges and palm-fringed rock pools fed by underground springs.

Inland you can experience the unique outback communities that shape the Pilbara. Visit the hottest town in Australia at **Marble Bar** and reward yourself with a cooling dip in one of the many nearby swimming spots.

The modern mining town of **Tom Price** is nestled in the Hamersley Ranges and offers a great opportunity to recharge and stock up on supplies as you head into one of Australia's most awe-inspiring natural wonders – **Karijini National Park**.

Deep rocky canyons lead to peaceful crystal-clear pools and stunning waterfalls. There is no shortage of spectacular spots to explore, including **Dales Gorge, Joffre Gorge, Knox Gorge, Weano Gorge, Fortescue Falls** and **Oxers Lookout**. The park is best visited around late autumn, winter and early spring. Give yourself a few days to take in the full range of impressions that the park offers visitors and enjoy nights unwinding under the star-filled outback skies.


You can explore the park on your own or book a tour that will see you scramble, abseil, kayak and tube through the many stunning gorges and beyond. More relaxed tour options are also available.

Newman is home to the renowned **East Pilbara Arts Centre** which showcases works by Martumili artists from across the Pilbara region. While you are here get a true sense of the scale of WA's vast iron-ore mining operations on a tour of the **Mount Whaleback Mine** site.

Heading back to the coast, the intriguing town of **Onslow** offers amazing fishing opportunities and good weather all year round. This town has a colourful past that includes pearl lugging, devastating cyclones and even Japanese bombings during World War II. Take a drive on the beach at **Four Mile Creek** to drop in a line before you stop off for lunch in the picnic area.

Onslow is one of the few places where you can watch the sun rise and set over water. Between May and September look out for the **Staircase to the Moon** events where the full moon rises over the exposed tidal flats to create the impression of a staircase leading to the moon.

The stunning **Mackerel Islands** and the surrounding reef system provide a valuable link for marine life between the Ningaloo Reef to the south and the Dampier Archipelago to the north, making it a fantastic spot for diving and snorkelling. **Thevenard Island** attracts keen fishers and holidaymakers who love the rustic life. The island is self-catering and you can reach it via ferry from Onslow or light aircraft from Exmouth.







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AUSTRALIA'S CORAL COAST



Ningaloo Reef / Nyinggulu, found in the World Heritagelisted Ningaloo Reef Marine Park, is the world's largest fringing reef. With more than 500 species of tropical fish living in and around roughly 300 species of coral, Ningaloo Reef is one of the longest nearshore reef systems in the world and can be accessed just by stepping off the beach.

The area is home to Ningaloo's 'big 3' marine creatures: whale sharks, humpback whales and manta rays, as well as an array of other marine life including turtles, dugongs and dolphins. **Turquoise Bay** is a 50-minute drive from Exmouth and a favourite spot for WA locals. Regarded as one of the state's best beaches, experienced swimmers can snorkel drift along the reef following the strong current from the south of the beach.

Outside the park's sanctuary zones Ningaloo Reef boasts some of Australia's best fishing spots. Fishing is permitted in 'general use' and 'recreational use' zones, in accordance with fishing regulations. For prized catches like tuna, marlin and sailfish you may consider joining a fishing charter.

The reef is serviced by two of WA's favourite holiday spots: the towns of **Exmouth** and **Coral Bay**.

Both towns offer plenty of amenities and allow you to hire equipment from local dive shops or join any number of reef-related tours to experience diving, snorkelling, kayaking and cruising in a glass-bottom boat. Tours to swim with whale sharks operate from March to August in Exmouth and from March to late June in Coral Bay. You can also book tours to swim with manta rays year-round and humpback whales from July to October.



A mask and snorkel is all you need to experience the beauty of the reef.

For those wanting to get an even deeper sense of these majestic waters, the **Exmouth Navy Pier** has been voted one of the world's top ten shore dives. **Dive Ningaloo** has the licence for scuba dives there.

A short drive from Exmouth is **Vlamingh Head Lighthouse**, an absolutely amazing place to watch a sunset.

Just 40 kilometres from Exmouth in **Cape Range National Park** is the remnant of an ancient reef thrust upwards by the movement of the earth's crust. Its limestone ranges form breathtaking canyons framed by pristine beaches. Take a guided boat tour between the sheer cliffs along **Yardie Creek**, keeping an eye out for wildlife such as ospreys and, if you are lucky, the rare black-footed wallabies hiding in the cliff walls. Hiking in Cape Range is most comfortable during the cooler months from April to September and trails include **Mandu Mandu Gorge**, **Shothole Canyon** and **Yardie Creek Trail**.

Located between Coral Bay and Exmouth, **Bullara Station** is a working cattle station that offers a glimpse into outback life, perfect for an overnight station stay or a delicious morning tea.

Situated between Coral Bay and Carnarvon are the beachside hideaways of **Quobba Station**, **Red Bluff** and **Gnaraloo**. Enjoy worldclass surfing, windsurfing, kite surfing and some of the state's best fishing spots. Between June and November the towering cliffs offer a great view of humpback whales migrating along the coast, and from December to March you can see turtles nesting and hatching.

Further south, you will find the awe-inspiring blowholes where powerful swells force the ocean water up through sea caves, shooting jets of water into the air.

The area around **Carnarvon** provides a wonderful opportunity to recharge and enjoy the region's famous produce and gourmet delights. Enjoy a picnic lunch at the Fascine, a beautiful bay lined with coconut and cotton palms. To really get in the foodie spirit pick up a map of the **'Fruit Loop' Drive Trail** from the visitor centre and stock up on fresh fruit, vegetables and seafood direct from local vendors.






World famous for the wild dolphins that regularly visit **Monkey Mia**, the World Heritage listed **Shark Bay** region is home to an overwhelming array of marine life. A great way to get a sense of it all is aboard a wildlife cruise where you can see manta rays, turtles, dugongs and migrating humpback whales.

Shark Bay has been identified by UNESCO as a biodiversity hotspot. It is home to a vast range of unique and endangered plant and animals species, as well as 35 per cent of Australia's total bird species. There are cultural tours available that will give you a deeper insight into the area and teach you about Shark Bay's local Malgana people and their connection to the place they call Gutharraguda.

The town of **Denham** is an ideal base while you explore Shark Bay. The friendly coastal town offers safe swimming beaches and all manner of amenities. Get an informative and interactive insight into the region's history and natural wonders at the Shark Bay Discovery Centre.

Shell Beach is a 120 kilometre stretch of snow-white beach made up of millions of tiny shells. The beach is a must-stop spot for photos and a swim in the clear, shallow waters.





The spectacular clifftops at **Eagle Bluff** offer breathtaking views across the World Heritage Area. Look out for turtles, manta rays, humpback whales and dugongs swimming below.

Steep Point is the western-most point of WA, as well as being one of the world's best land-based fishing spots. It is a great vantage point to see the **Zuytdorp Cliffs**, which tower 170 metres above sea level.



Murchison River Gorge in Kalbarri National Park, where nature has carved out the layers of coloured rock. Hike one of the many well-marked trails throughout the park and stop for a photo at the iconic Nature's Window. If you are feeling more adventurous book a canoe tour along the river or try your hand at abseiling. From July until October hundreds of species of wildflowers burst into bloom and transform the park into a sea of colour.

The national park also extends 13 kilometres along the coast with protected swimming bays nestled among plunging coastal cliffs. Take the short drive from town or better still, follow the walk and cycle path that runs along the coast to explore secluded beaches, surf breaks and whale watching spots. For a different way to explore the coastline take a guided tour to ride a quad bike or buggy along Wagoe Beach.

Just a little further south is the famous Pink Lake at Hutt **Lagoon**, an iconic photo stop for many visitors. Featured on TV and in advertising all over the world, the lake's carotenoid-producing algae changes colour from deep red to bright pink depending on the time of day. 

Sixty kilometres west of Geraldton lies the Abrolhos Islands, an archipelago of 122 islands clustered into three main groups: the Wallabi Group, Easter Group and Pelsaert Group. Thought to be named from a Portuguese phrase meaning 'open your eyes', the islands have claimed many shipwrecks over the centuries, including the Batavia in 1629, which you can learn about at the Geraldton Museum. The Islands offer activities to suit a variety of interests, including fishing and cray fishing, swimming, snorkelling and diving. Go bird watching, see marine and wildlife including sea lions, dolphins, wallabies and lizards or let one of the many tour operators show you the spectacular islands on a scenic from a boat or the air.

Sydney II Memorial, built in honour of the sailors who lost their lives off the coast in 1941, provides stunning views.

Twenty minutes south of Geraldton is the charming pioneering town of Greenough, with renowned history, bird-watching, walking, fishing and the beautiful Greenough River with its dramatically leaning trees.

Between July and October wildflower season turns the entire region into a dazzling display of colour. Head inland to the historic town of Yalgoo and see meadows of white, pink, cream and yellow flowers carpet the outback. Flowers grow all over, and often right on the roadside, so you don't have to walk far to see them in all their glory.

A great scenic drive for wildflower fans is Chapman Valley, just north of Gerldton, where bright pink, blue and white everlastings colour the landscape during the season. The area between Nanson and Yuna is where you will find some of the most stunning wildflower shows.


The fascinating and somewhat eerie ghost town of **Gwalia**, near **Leonora**, reveals more of the region's rich gold rush heritage. The majestic State Hotel, several miners cottages and commercial buildings now lay abandoned after the mine closed in 1963. Hoover House, built in 1898, was home to former mine manager and eventual 31st President of the USA, Herbert Hoover.

world. Camp under clear starry skies and wake up to a magic morning light that creates a visual spectacle of the red island

mounds across the dry lake.

Coolgardie was the birthplace of the gold rush that fuelled the largest mass migration of people in Australia's history and retains much of its pioneering heritage charms.





The stark and unique landscape of the **Nullarbor Plain** sits atop the world's biggest single piece of limestone measuring 200,000 square kilometres. Crossing the plain is considered one of the world's greatest road adventures, with plenty to see along the way. The area is extremely popular with four-wheel drive enthusiasts keen to explore the rugged granite outcrops, ancient salt lakes and stunning displays of wildflowers.

Possibly the world's most unique golf course, the **Nullarbor Links** spans 1,365 kilometres between Kalgoorlie and Ceduna in South Australia. Eighteen participating towns or roadhouses along the Eyre Highway each have a single hole featuring a tee, a green, a fairway consisting of rugged outback terrain and golfing equipment available for hire.

The region is also developing a vibrant arts and culture scene set against the dramatic backdrop of red outback plains. Amid the historical museums, ghost towns and self-drive adventure trails you will find multicultural festivals celebrating connection to land and language, large scale public art works, sculptures and spectacular galleries.

Cocklebiddy is famous for its cave systems, which are among the largest in the world. Do a spot of fishing or whale watching (in season) at Twilight Cove, located 32 kilometres south. Near Caiguna, you will find the longest stretch of straight road in the world – all 146.6 kilometres of it – commonly known as the 90 Mile Straight.

Take a detour off the Eyre Highway and visit the **Great Australian Bight** to take in the amazing views from the 70-metre high cliffs along the remote coastline. The Eyre Bird Observatory is home to more than 240 species of birds, many of which are rare or endangered. The observatory is housed in an old stone building nestled between leafy woodlands and striking white dunes.

Mundrabilla is the site of the biggest meteorite ever found in Australia. Explore the old telegraph station ruins and enjoy the ocean views from the top of the escarpment at **Eucla**.

The Nullarbor also marks the start of the **Great Western Woodlands**, the largest and healthiest temperate woodland remaining on Earth, which runs all the way across the Goldfields to the Wheatbelt.




In the southern part of the Wheatbelt around **Narrogin** and **Wandering** there is an emerging wine region. To the east the historic town of **Westonia** is where the Goldfields meets the Wheatbelt.

Float in the salt pool near the town of **Hyden** before you explore the world-famous **Katter Kich / Wave Rock**. Standing 15 metres high and 100 metres long, it is a sight to behold. Close by is **Hippo's Yawn** rock and **Mulka's Cave** which hosts a collection of 450 ancient rock paintings.

You can find other granite outcrops and rocks nearby including Elachbutting Rock and Beringbooding Rock near Mukinbudin, and Kokerbin Rock near the town of **Bruce Rock**. The **Dryandra Woodland** is the largest remnant of original woodland in Australia's Western Wheatbelt and is known as one of the world's flora and fauna hotspots. From June to early November you will be surrounded by a sea of dazzling colour as WA's wildflowers bloom in their billions. Check at the local visitor centres to find out what's in bloom and where.

Challenge your four-wheel driving skills with a detour along the **Holland Track** or head west to take the more comfortable, but definitely no less quirky, **Tin Horse Highway** from **Kulin**.



The dramatic outback vistas of the Gascoyne provide a spectacular backdrop to the sea of wildflowers that transform the landscape every year. The region's ancient landscapes are full of stories and rich in Aboriginal culture.

Test your driving skills on some of the challenging and scenic drive trails along the Gunbarrel Highway and Canning Stock Route.

Millions of years of erosion have etched out the rock formations, valleys and cliff faces of the Kennedy Range National Park. Further east you can see Mount Augustus (Burringurrah to the Wadjari people) loom 850 metres above the surrounding landscape. It is the biggest 'rock' in the world and is about twice the size of Uluru. You can see petroglyphs up close on walking routes around its base.



Surrounded by green pastures, orchards, sparkling coastline and the Leschenault Inlet, the cosmopolitan coastal city of **Bunbury** is at the heart of the **Geographe Region**. Learn about the friendly dolphins and other fascinating marine life of **Koombana Bay** at the **Dolphin Discovery Centre**.

Visit the **Bunbury Regional Art Gallery** to see works by prominent Australian artists including Albert Namatjira and Ernest Philpot, as well works from Noongar artists such as Bunbury local Troy Bennell. You can get a fascinating insight into local history by taking a tour which combines historical fact, stories of early settlers and dreaming stories specific to the region.

The dairy farming region around **Harvey** extends south through the rolling hills and jarrah forests of the Collie River Valley. Load up on fresh local produce in the pretty farming towns of **Capel**, **Boyanup**, **Donnybrook** and **Balingup**.

The adventure playground of **Collie** is connected to Wellington Dam by the Collie Mural Trail, a huge outdoor art gallery that tells stories of the region's heritage including Guido van Helten's 8,000 square metre mega-mural on the **Wellington Dam**. The surrounding Wellington National Park is a mecca for mountain bikers and hikers alike.

There are many four-wheel drive tracks you can explore before stopping off for some boating or water skiing at **Stockton Lake**, an abandoned mine site that is now a popular recreation spot. Explore the lush, green rolling hills dotted with cows and ribbons of vineyards through the **Ferguson Valley**. The region is home to a large number of exceptional wineries known for producing excellent Shiraz, Chardonnay, Sauvignon Blanc and Semillon.

Keep an eye out for the colourful kingdom known as **Gnomesville**, a unique collection of over 5,000 garden gnomes just off the roundabout linking Wellington Mill Road and Ferguson Road.






The vibrant holiday town of **Busselton / Undalup** is built around its famous Foreshore. Stop in at any number of venues while the kids enjoy the fantastic playground featuring its own shipwreck. Stroll or catch the train along the 1.8 kilometre long historic **Busselton Jetty** and get a glimpse of the sea life underneath at the Underwater Observatory located at the end. There are plenty of great opportunities to sample the local produce or to join the locals for a night out at one of the many dining options around town. You can upgrade your set-up at the **Busselton Caravan & Camping Show** in September.

By the tranquil waters of **Geographe Bay** are excellent walk and cycle paths that lead you along the endless white sandy beaches stretching all the way to Cape Naturaliste 30 kilometres to the west. The calm waters are ideal for swimming and offer many great spots for fishing, especially in salmon season.

Seven kilometres north-east of Busselton is the **Tuart Forest National Park**, part of the only remaining natural tuart forest in the entire world, with many of the trees estimated to be between 300 and 400 years old.

The cave offers a striking display of stalagmite, stalactite, helictite and shawl formations. Head south to **Canal Rocks**, where the constant surging and crashing of the ocean against the coastline has chiseled out dramatic channels through the granite rocks, and don't forget to take a dip at **Smiths Beach**.

The **Cape to Cape Track** is the most well-known of several walking trails throughout the area. Following the coast from Cape Naturaliste to Cape Leeuwin near Augusta, you can walk a section or challenge yourself by doing the whole hike.

The region is internationally acclaimed for its Chardonnay, Semillon, Sauvignon Blanc, Riesling, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Shiraz. A growing crop of makers is experimenting with bold new flavours that are well worth exploring. 
There are ample opportunities to sample delectable local fresh produce, from berries, fudge, preserves and olive oils to a large assortment of gourmet lines.

To get the full experience you can choose from guided tours that include canoeing, catching marron, a private winery lunch and a trip to the **Wilyabrup Cliffs**.

Australia's South West



The stunning coastline around Margaret River has been a surfing mecca for generations. There are over 40 surf spots to choose from, depending on conditions. The famed Surfers Point at **Prevelly** is a great spot to watch surfers take on the ocean.

A huge system of over 150 spectacular limestone caves lies beneath the surface of the Leeuwin Naturaliste Ridge. The best known and most accessible of these can be found along the aptly named Caves Road. **Mammoth Cave** is a natural time capsule, home to ancient fossil remains, while **Jewel Cave** is the biggest show cave in WA. **Lake Cave** is a pristine chamber with a tranquil lake reflecting the stunning formations.

In the **Boranup Forest**, between Caves Road and the coast, towering karri trees dwarf the road beneath. Karri is the third tallest tree in the world and this beautiful regrowth forest is just over 100 years old. With many of the trees reaching upwards of 60 metres.

Continue along Caves Road towards **Augusta** to meet the stingrays that regularly come close to shore at **Hamelin Bay**. The clear waters of this wide, sandy bay offer safe swimming and beach fishing opportunities, as well as snorkelling and diving amongst the shipwrecks and caves just off-shore.

Nearby, Australia's tallest mainland lighthouse at **Cape Leeuwin** sits on a spectacular peninsula overlooking the meeting point between the Indian and Southern Oceans. You can spot humpback and southern right whales as they migrate along the coast from June through to September.

The most famous of the many beaches is the iconic **Cottesloe Beach** where you can treat yourself to a delicious breakfast or settle in for a long lunch at one of the many beach-front venues. South of here you can enjoy the turquoise waters of **Leighton Beach** and **Fremantle**.

Or you can head north along West Coast Highway to **City Beach**. Stop in at **Reabold Hill** for sweeping views of the city from the highest natural point along the coast.

Perth's northern beaches are collectively known as the **Sunset Coast**, which stretches from Scarborough to Two Rocks. The bustling foreshore at **Scarborough Beach** offers great swimming, surfing and a large range of entertainment options.

A little further north, the West Coast Scenic Drive leads you past protected bays and beaches from **Trigg Beach** to **Hillarys Boat Harbour**. Along the way, you will find some stunning photo opportunities, particularly at **Mettam's Pool** and **Sorrento Beach**.

Hillarys Boat Harbour provides a safe swimming environment and plenty of family fun. Explore the network of boardwalks filled with a variety of shops and restaurants or learn more about WA's underwater environment at AQWA.

Mullaloo Beach and Mindarie Marina await in the northern suburbs. Stroll the Mediterranean-style boardwalks that lead you to cafés and restaurants or enjoy a local brew at the microbrewery. Further north you can discover Yanchep National Park's extensive caves and local Aboriginal culture and visit the Yanchep Lagoon.



Perth has a thriving cultural scene, particularly from January to March when the **Perth Festival** and **Perth Fringe Festival** bring the city to life with a huge program of performance and events by artists from across the globe. The renowned West Australian Symphony Orchestra and the West Australian Opera perform yearround. In March you can set yourself up with everything you need to explore WA at the **Perth Caravan & Camping Show**.

Across the river from the city centre is **South Perth** and the **Perth Zoo**. **Optus Stadium** is one of the world's best stadiums and offers a year-round selection of sport and musical events. Take in stunning views of the river by climbing to the top of **Matagarup Bridge** and if you are up for a thrill take the zip-line back down.

The jewel in Perth's crown is the majestic **Kings Park**, 400 hectares of native bushland and manicured gardens which offer sweeping views of the city and beyond. Explore the walk trails that cross the park to get a fabulous insight into the local fauna. At the foot of Kings Park is **Elizabeth Quay**, where you can enjoy a bite or grab a drink, with stunning views of the skyline. Or you can take a river cruise to **Fremantle**, the **Swan Valley Wine Region** or **Rottnest Island**.

The lively inner city suburbs around Perth offer an array of culture, boutique shopping, dining and entertainment options. Just some of the neighbourhoods worth exploring include Victoria Park, East Perth, Leederville, West Perth, Subiaco, Maylands, Mount Lawley, Highgate, North Perth and Mount Hawthorn. You will find no shortage of excellent cafés, cuisine from around the world and quirky small bars to enjoy while you wander through their leafy village high streets.





FREMANTLE

The colourful port city of Fremantle / Walyalup is home to a host of eateries, bars and cafés dotted around the beautifully preserved 19th century port city. Immerse yourself in an eclectic mix of the arty and the alternative imbued with the area's colourful past.

Soak up the rich atmosphere, exotic aromas, sights and sounds of the Fremantle Markets, before you venture to one of the many bars and restaurants for a snack and refreshments. Art lovers will enjoy the **Fremantle Arts Centre** which offers a rich program of exhibitions, art courses and music events, including free concerts every Sunday in summer.

The UNESCO World Heritage-listed Fremantle Prison is a spectacular backdrop to a host of concerts and events. The most intact convict gaol in Australia lets you indulge in some historical intrigue with a true-crime tour; some allow you to explore the underground tunnels by canoe.

Home to several waterside restaurants, Fremantle Fishing Boat Harbour is a popular place for locals and visitors. On the docks, near the entrance of the Swan River, is the WA Maritime Museum, housing unique galleries that explore WA's relationship with the sea. The museum is also home to Australia II, the winning America's Cup yacht.

ROCKINGHAM

Rockingham is a popular tourist spot with safe beaches, watersports and beachfront eateries. Kayak, snorkel or swim in the tranquil waters including the Shoalwater Islands Marine Park, located only 500 metres offshore, where you can meet bottle-nosed dolphins, sea lions and pelicans, as well as a spectacular array of other birds and sealife. Take it all in from a glass-bottom boat cruise departing from Penguin Island.





Perfect for day trips or to recharge after hitting the trails, you can browse through arts and crafts studios or follow the Perth Hills Wine Trail and visit wineries, restaurants and cideries set amongst beautiful rolling green landscapes and lush jarrah forests.






Only a short drive, but a world away from the bustle of Perth, is the Avon Valley. Experience country hospitality and enjoy local delights at one of the many cafés, restaurants and bakeries. Meander through craft shops and museums and sample the local produce including jams, olives, chocolate and honey. Always worth your while is a stop at one of the region's many historical pubs for a yarn with the friendly locals.

Plan a tour through the character towns of Northam, Toodyay, York, Beverley and Goomalling and soak up the charm of the Avon Valley. These vibrant towns are only a short drive apart, set amid rolling hills and, during the season, fringed by fields of wildflowers.

York was WA's first inland settlement, established in 1831. Spend the day here wandering through the historic museums and antique shops or learn about local culture at the Bilya Koort Boodja Centre for Noongar Culture and Environmental Knowledge in Northam. For a stunning new perspective of the valley get up among the clouds and see the picturesque farmlands from a hot air balloon.


